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National data on Roma population and their geological distribution in Slovenia

- The estimated number of Roma population in Slovenia varies depending on the institutions. Various sources indicate that there is approx. 7,000 to 12,000 Roma citizens in Slovenia, representing 0.5% of the total population.
- In the national census, 3,246 persons stated that they were members of the Roma Community and 3,834 persons stated that the Roma language was their mother tongue.










National data on Roma population and their geological distribution in Slovenia.



 Most of the Roma populatoion live in Dolenjska, Posavje, Bela Krajina, Prekmurje and in major cities such as: Ljubljana, Maribor, Velenje, Celje, Radovljica and Jesenice.

- High rate of school dropouts,
- Need for Roma assistants,
- Negative socio-cultural environment,
- No pre-school preparation,
- Language barrier,
- Low attendance rates.









Reasons for developing additional approaches in Roma education

- No trust in official institutions,
- Low participation in education and learning,
- Low motivation,
- Socio-demographic characteristics.




